The Links of North Dakota

North Dakota is home to many unique golf experiences, from top-notch courses to local diamonds in the rough. With 121 public courses, there are plenty of links and tee times to go around.

Golfers can experience world-class golf for a great price at the Arnold Palmer signature golf course King's Walk in Grand Forks; the scenic Badlands course of Bully Pulpit in Medora; the black sand bunkers of Hawktree in Bismarck; or The Links of North Dakota along the shores of Lake Sakakawea near Williston. Players will find championship and unique golf experiences across the state.

For a unique experience, Bois de Sioux Golf Course in Wahpeton is the only public golf course in the nation that is split between two states, North Dakota and Minnesota.

For an even bigger border crossing, head to Gateway Cities Golf Club in Portal. Eight holes and the No. 9 tee box are in Canada, but the number nine green is in the USA, the only known international hole in North America.

For a great deal, try the Triple Challenge by playing Bully Pulpit, Hawktree and The Links of ND. Visit any of these nationally ranked golf clubs and receive a punch card to play all three for the price of two.

DAY 1

Morning — Wahpeton

Bois de Sioux Golf Club: This is the only public golf course in the nation to have nine holes in one state and nine holes in another.

Afternoon — Fargo/West Fargo

Edgewood Golf Course: Established in the mid 1920s, Edgewood is an 18-hole, par 71 championship golf course located along the Red River. Its beautiful, tree-lined fairways provides a challenge to every level of golfer.



DAY 2

Morning — Grand Forks

King's Walk Golf Course: The links-style course is characterized with mounds, moguls, native grasses and pine trees interspersed with lakes styled in a dry southwestern arroyo landscape. The Arnold Palmer signature golf course opened in 2002 and is one of the area's premier golf courses.

Afternoon/Evening — Minot

The new Minot Country Club replaces the original built in 1928 and destroyed in the 2011 flood. Seven sets of tees lead golfers on tours ranging from 4,485 to 6,870 yards. Architect Jim Engh took advantage of the terrain to craft the rolling fairways through native grass and wooded draws.

DAY 3

Morning — Portal

Ever wanted to play two countries at one time? Head to Gateway Cities Golf Club for your chance. Eight greens are still the old-fashioned sand greens variety, but one green is real grass, challenging your putting skills. The ninth hole can take one hour and 10 seconds to play as the ball moves from central standard time to central daylight savings time.

Afternoon/Evening — Williston Area

Water isn't a factor at the Links of North Dakota but roughly 80 sand bunkers and wind are on this par-72, 18-hole championship course. Players have five tee boxes to choose from as they set out for the wide fairways and punishing native prairie grass rough. Rated #65 in the 2008 Golf Digest Top 100 Public Courses.

DAY 4

Medora

Bully Pulpit Golf Course:

The 18-hole course will play to a par-72 and you have the choice of five tee boxes from which to challenge yourself against this course. The course terrain ranges from the walkable Little Missouri River bottoms to the challenging elevation changes and dramatic setting of the holes in the Badlands section of the course. Ranked #1 in the 2006 Golf Digest New Affordable Public Courses.

DAY 5

Dickinson

Heart River Golf Course:

18 holes of challenging golf features a wide-open front nine and a back nine that offers plenty of trees and water. Heart River has one of the longest playing seasons in the state, open from March through October for the regular season, and from November 1 through February 28, weather permitting.

Bonus

Bismarck-Mandan Area

Hawktree Golf Club:

Hawktree architect Jim Engh created a wonderful course that presents the player with a Scottish-links look with a modern touch. Engh used elevation changes, native prairie grasses, large greens and four tee boxes to give players of any age or ability a chance to enjoy a great golf experience. The beautiful layout is about wind and water. Wind is a common factor in high plains golf, and Burnt Creek is in play on eight holes. Another distinctive feature of Hawktree is Engh's use of black coal slag in the bunkers. Ranked #24 in the 2008 Golf Digest Top 100 Public Courses.
