There's something special about rolling through North Dakota on two wheels. Maybe it's the warm sun on your face and the wind in your hair; the rolling hills and smells of fresh-cut alfalfa; the unique outof-the-way diners that serve up the perfect eat-and-run fare. Don't let the opportunity to ride around the state slip away. Map up, eat up, gas up and hit the road. Unforgettable sights and sounds abound around every corner.

The North Dakota horizon stretches out endlessly ahead and your cares and concerns are left as little more than a speck disappearing into your rearview mirrors. Great highways dissect 70,000 square miles of rural bliss and take riders effortlessly between the state's larger cities. You won't find a lot of things here that you do elsewhere: smog, traffic, headaches. But you will find things here you won't find anywhere else: the nicest people, the North Dakota Badlands, Pembina Gorge, rolling hills and grasslands and the wide-open farmland of the Red River Valley.

North Dakota Scenic ByRider Program

NORTH Dakota Be Legendary.™

Old Red/Old Ten Scenic Byway

Roughly parallels Interstate 94 from Mandan to Dickinson. 108 miles along Old Highway 10. Take in the natural beauty of the buttes, river valleys, prairies and small towns.

Sheyenne River Valley National Scenic Byway

Located in the southeast corner of the state, it reaches from Lisbon past Valley City. It is North Dakota's first nationally recognized scenic byway.

Standing Rock National Native American Scenic Byway

Begins at the Cannonball River and continues 35 miles south to the South Dakota state line. History comes alive on this journey through the land of Lakota Chief Sitting Bull, the Lewis and Clark Expedition and the final resting place of Lewis and Clark's interpreter Sakakawea.

Killdeer Mountains Four Bears Scenic Byway

Sixty-four miles from Manning to New Town, this byway spans from the Killdeer Mountains to the Little Missouri River breaks and Badlands.

Sakakawea Scenic Byway

Beginning at Highway 200A from Washburn to Stanton, this byway boasts remarkable views of the Missouri River valley and some of the nation's most outstanding Lewis and Clark destinations.

Turtle Mountain Scenic Byway

Highway 43 west from St. John through the Turtle Mountains to Highway 14, this byway passes by farmsteads, pastureland, clear blue lakes, lush foliage, wildflowers and an abundance of wildlife.

Highway 1804

From the South Dakota line to Montana, this open road offers amazing views of the Missouri River valley and Lake Sakakawea from the north shore.

Sheyenne River Valley

Hidden away in the Red River Valley, this ride takes visitors through tree-covered hills along the Sheyenne River.



Highway 200 and 200A

The best way to get a look at all the topography North Dakota has to offer is to ride right down the middle of the state from east to west on Highway 200. Quaint towns and scenic sites can be found between Hillsboro and Cartwright.

Highway 22

Leaving I-94 at Dickinson, Highway 22 leads to the Killdeer Mountains, into the Badlands and on to the high plateaus near Watford City and New Town.

Enchanted Highway

If you are heading towards Dickinson on Interstate 94 and out of nowhere, you come up on a flock of geese, BIG geese; you have found the Enchanted Highway. Exit 72 is your starting point and



you will find the last statue about 30 miles south near Regent. Every so many miles in between, you will encounter another creation with a parking area and information kiosks. Motorcycle groups often ride the route to take advantage of its photo opportunities.
