Located on the edge of the west in North Dakota, Watford City offers so much to see and do.



Long X Trading Post: Visitor Center and Pioneer Museum

This easy-to-find visitor center is a great place to start any adventure in McKenzie County. Talk to the locals, enjoy a cup of coffee or ice cream, and shop for locally-made Pride of Dakota gifts. Then, check out The Visitor Center exhibits. A must see is the largest, most well-preserved fossil ever found in North Dakota; a 17,000 lb. petrified tree stump. The two-story Pioneer Museum showcases traveling cultural and geological exhibits and features stories of some of McKenzie County's first settlers and exhibits on early ranching, farming, and oil and gas exploration.



Tobacco Gardens Resort & Marina & Birnt Hills Trail

Just 26 miles north of Watford City, nestled on the south shore of Lake Sakakawea. are two destinations for the year-round-outdoor-explorer's dream. Navigate the waters of Lake Sakakawea in a kayak. Or hike, ride, or bike the Birnt Hills Trail, and then enjoy the rugged comforts at the Tobacco Gardens Resort & Marina. Set up camp, fish for your dinner, grab a bite at the full-service restaurant or stop in the well-stocked convenience store.

Theodore Roosevelt National Park



He was a skinny, young, spectacled traveler from New York. He could not have imagined how his adventure in this remote and unfamiliar place would forever alter the course of the nation.


Visitors to Theodore Roosevelt National Park's North Unit will find abundant watchable wildlife including bison, elk, prairie dogs, deer, and golden eagles, just to name a few.

The Visitor Center, located at the entrance, is the beginning of a Scenic Byway drive of 14 miles that takes you through the North Unit.

The campground is located four miles from the entrance of the Theodore Roosevelt National Park's North Unit. Camping is available to guests year-round.

Little Missouri National Grasslands

Stretching over one million acres, the Little Missouri National Grasslands offers the opportunity to view the only bighorn sheep in the state of North Dakota. Elk, antelope, whitetail and mule deer, sharptailed grouse, eagles, falcons, and the busy prairie dogs often present themselves for the enjoyment of the visitor. The grasslands stretch from the banks of Lake Sakakawea to the north, to the state line to the west, and through McKenzie County. The MHA Nation welcomes visitors to experience their vibrant culture. There are six non-motorized designated trails in the McKenzie Ranger District. Adventurers can explore the trails by hiking, biking, or as Teddy Roosevelt did, on horseback. Backcountry camping can be enjoyed anywhere on the Little Missouri Grasslands





Maah Daah Hey Trail

The Maah Daah Hey Trail is a world-renowned 144-mile trail that weaves through the north and south units of Theodore Roosevelt National Park and the Little Missouri National Grasslands. The name originated with the Mandan Tribes and translates to "land that will be around for a long time." This trail system features nearly every type of terrain found in western North Dakota. This varies from grassy flats and ridges to very rough, steep clay badlands buttes with everything in between, including river bottoms and wooded draws to rolling prairie. The north end of the trail is located just across the Little Missouri River from the entrance of Theodore Roosevelt National Park

Lake Sakakawea

Lake Sakakawea, a reservoir on the Missouri River, makes up the entire northern border of McKenzie County and is the largest lake in North Dakota. The lake is named in honor of the young Shoshone guide Sakakawea who served as an interpreter for Lewis & Clark as they explored this territory in the early 1800s. The historic waters are still a favorite for explorers and offer recreation for water sports of all types. Boating and water sports abound at the lake. Pleasure and fishing boats, sailboats, wind-surfers, and canoers are commonly seen enjoying the vast expanse of the lake. In additon, swimming, waterskiing, jet-skiing ice-fishing, and scuba diving are just some of the favorite activities. Pack your gear and hit the lake any time of year!

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Embracing a Vibrant Culture

The Mandan, Hidatsa, and Arikara, known collectively as the MHA Nation or Three Affiliated Tribes. welcome visitors to experience their vibrant culture. The tribes believe their presence in North America is from the beginning of time. On the shores of Lake Sakakawea, just 45 miles east of Watford City, you can walk in the steps of indigenous peoples inside an earthlodge at the Earthlodge Village. The Three Affiliated Tribes Museum features artwork, crafts, artifacts and historical pieces. Stimulate your senses at one of MHA Nation's summer powwows and events.

HISTORY

Lewis & Clark Trail

The Confluence, or the junction where two rivers meet, of the Missouri and Yellowstone rivers is located in McKenzie County. This was an important stop for the Native American tribes, traders and trappers, and also a strategic military point.

The Confluence played an important role in the Lewis and Clark (Corps of Discovery) expedition. They considered the Confluence of these two great rivers as one of the most important places in North America. The Corps of Discovery traveled this section of the Missouri River corridor in 1804 and on their return journey in 1806.

The Missouri-Yellowstone Confluence Center, Fort Union Trading Post and Fort Buford State Historic Site, are a short 50 mile drive from Watford City.

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Fort Union National Historic Site

Fort Union was the most important fur trading post on the upper Missouri for 39 years (1828-1867) – longer than any other post on the frontier. It was renowned as a center of peaceful economic and social exchange between Plains Indians and white cultures. The fort that you see today is a full-scale reconstruction built on the exact locations of the original structures.

Fort Buford State Historic Site

Fort Buford was one of a number of military posts established to protect overland and river routes used by immigrants settling the West. While it served an essential role as the sentinel on the northern plains for 29 years, it is probably best remembered as the place where the famous Hunkpapa Sioux leader, Sitting Bull, surrendered in 1881.

Arnegard's Family 4th

The annual event celebrates America's birthday during one of the best 4th of July celebrations in western North Dakota. Activities include a BBQ, games, a parade, and a huge fireworks display.

McKenzie County Fair

While the rodeo performances are the main feature, there are lots of exciting attractions at the fair. Highlights include a demolition derby, beef barbecue, evening dances, petting zoo, 4-H livestock show, horsemanship shows, and an exciting carnival.

Alexander's Old Settler's Day

Alexander's Old Settler's Day is spread across four days. It's one of McKenzie County's largest events and features a parade, programs in the park, an art & craft show, dances, and a community church service.



The Best of the West Ribfest

Get fired up for one of North Dakota's premier events, Best of the West RibFest. Teams compete for top honors serving up more than 6,000 pounds of ribs annually, along with a kid's zone, festival food, street vendors, and live music. Come for the ribs, stay for the music.

Powwows

Powwows are a time for people to gather, sing and dance, renew acquaintances, and make new friends. Powwows are a visual extravaganza beyond compare.

Homefest

Homefest is a weekend filled with fun. The event features golf tournaments, street dances, food, art, and activities for the whole family.
