MHA Nation Interpretive Center grand opening is held in New Town

Representatives from the Three Affiliated Tribes, State Tourism and North Dakota's Congressional delegation took part in the grand opening of the MHA Nation Interpretive Center in New Town in May.

Visitors to the state-of-the art center on the shores of Lake Sakakawea and adjacent to the Earthlodge Village, will be able to learn more about the unique culture of the Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara people through displays,

an interactive kiosk, programs and interaction with the staff. Living history programs will tell the story of the MHA Nation.

The center has a 250-seat event room and a kitchen for preparing traditional meals for the public at special events. A classroom will be provided for cultural educational classes like traditional food, beading, tanning hides, etc. There is a coffee shop and gift shop and a 500-seat outdoor amphitheater.

Trio of new grants are available to help travel and tourism industry


The North Dakota Department of Commerce has announced new grants to help the state's travel and tourism industry withstand the negative impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Travel Agent and Tour Operators Grant (TATO) application window opened June 1. The TATO is designed to assist travel agents and tour operators within the travel and tourism industry. Funds from the grant are

to be used to reimburse eligible entities for lost revenue. Eligible applicants may be awarded up to \$100,000 per qualifying location. Click here for more TATO information.

The application window for Events and Support Services Grant (ESSG) focusing on venue-based businesses opens June 10 at 10 a.m., CDT. While these businesses face dramatic declines in revenue, they continue to be pillars in both rural and urban communities across North Dakota. This grant, which is capped at \$100,000 per location, will help event centers and those who support such venues survive the pandemic. Click here for more ESSG information.

The USDA is making up to \$3 million in cooperative agreement grants available under the Rural Placemaking Innovation Challenge (RPIC). Eligible entities may use the funds to help rural communities create plans to enhance capacity for broadband access, preserve cultural and historic structures and support development in transportation, housing and recreational spaces. 


Visitor Services adds live chat
